In April 2016, a RESTOR International team endured the 36 hour journey to Bahir Dar Ethiopia to begin a fourteen day medical mission to restore lives of children and young adults. The team included 14 medical personnel from all over western Canada and 8 non-medical Rotary volunteers who worked in partnership with clinical staff at the Gamby Hospital. The mission had an



overwhelming response with 119 patients triaged by the team including many who walked long distances to take advantage of the rare opportunity to be treated. We were able to perform free reconstructive surgeries on 53 children and young adults, clocking up over 115 surgical hours. Almost all of the patients were treated for repair of previous burn injuries sustained in accidents involving open cooking fires. Ethiopia has very little, if any, primary burn care and as a result often suffer life altering disfigurements a n d deformities that would not occur here in Canada.

#### SUSTAINABILITY & EDUCATION

RESTOR International's mandate extends beyond providing clinical services. We look to educate and teach medical techniques that our partner communities can utilize over time. By building up the skills and knowledge of our international colleagues during our missions, we ensure our work carries on after we're gone. We were able to do this not just at the Gamby Hospital but also in the wider medical community in Bahir Dar. Our medical team not only mentored Gamby Hospital's surgeons and nurses but also offered extensive clinical training, reaching over 109 multidisciplinary colleagues. Topics in the curriculum ranged from pain management (a new concept in Ethiopia) to anaesthesia, pediatric issues and surgical assessment.

#### **GAMBY BURN CENTRE PROJECT**

As part of our strategy to ensure our missions create sustainability, RESTOR International is collaborating with the Gamby Hospital and Dr. Einar Eriksen, a Norwegian plastic surgeon who has lived and worked in Ethiopia for more than 30 years. RESTOR International has purchased specialized burn equipment to be left at the Gamby Hospital and we are providing funding for skin grafting and wound care for 15 patients in 2017. The equipment will be used by Dr. Erikson and is critical to our goal of building up a proficient burn program in Bahir Dar. He is now training local medical professionals at the Gamby Hospital so that they can treat acute burns and eventually perform their own skin grafting. The equipment purchase supports this advanced training, ensuring our mandate of sustainability is fulfilled at the local level. A referral program has also been set up with the Felege Hiwot Public Hospital in Bahir Dar. Dr Erikson will continue to mentor the Gamby Hospital staff until they are able to provide the surgical and nursing care required in Bahir Dar.

#### **CURE HOSPITAL REFERRAL PROGRAM**

Thanks to the efforts of Dr. Ericksen we have also established an agreement with the Cure Hospital in Addis Ababa (an American funded and operated hospital) which allows Dr. Eriksen to provide 10 free reconstructive surgeries for children with severe disfigurements this year. These surgeries are too complicated to be operated at the Gamby Hospital in Bahir Dar. RESTOR International will cover the cost of food and transportation to Addis for the children and their guardians during their stay and a nominal honorarium. We have already completed 5 of the 10 surgeries.



#### MEDICAL TEAM PROFILE

RESTOR's volunteer Medical Consultant Dr. Stan Valnicek (pictured above) is a Kelowna Plastic Surgeon with a passion for paying it forward. Born in the Czech Republic, Stan moved at the age of five to Ghana with his family. His father was an obstetrician and spent five years in Africa doing UN sponsored medical missions. This inspired Stan's involvement of giving back. Stan has volunteered with RESTOR since its beginnings as Rotaplast Canada. He's been on ten missions as the lead reconstructive surgeon. He guides the medical team, determining who is eligible for surgery, overseeing the follow up care, collaborating with the

physicians and nurses on the ground and mentoring surgeons in the OR. Stan received his MD from the University of Saskatchewan. In 1992, he spent six months at the Hospital for Sick Children in Toronto, followed by a yearlong fellowship at Utah University Medical Center doing additional pediatric plastic surgery training as well as upper extremity and microsurgery. He moved to Kelowna in 1998. Stan recently completed five years as Section Head of Plastic Surgery for BC. He has been on missions to Mexico, the Philippines and to Ethiopia four times.

# ROTARIANS FOR GLOBAL HEALTH

RESTOR International relies on the support of its donors to mount each medical mission. "This is so special because we've never had gowns in the past", says Mission Director, Jeannie Bird. Patients often arrive in the tattered clothes that they've walked (sometimes for days) in. Now we will be able to give each patient a gown and some dignity prior to their surgery.

Bill Redmond, a Kelowna businessman and Rotarian is a long-time donor to RESTOR International, beginning when we were known as Rotaplast Canada.

# Gahew

One patient who came to us through the GAMBY BURN CENTER PROJECT is Gahew Zemen. As is common in the rural areas of Ethiopia, people do not have access to medical treatment and often visit the local Shaman or healer. Gahew was treated by the healer who initially applied a tourniquet to his ankle after a minor injury. Unfortunately, this created a very serious problem as the tourniquet was left on too long and he was unable to walk.



This required a lengthy surgery on his lower leg, exposing and cleaning the bone and eventual skin grafting. Dr Eriksen was able to supervise the surgery and will follow the Gamby doctors as they care for the wound and eventually do skin grafts.



# Abeve

Three year old Abeye fell into a home cooking fire. This is very common where a main source of cooking fuel is open fire. Because Abeye's family lives in the hills around Bahir Dar they were unable to seek medical care for him right away. His right hand was extremely contracted from the burn scar. After surgery at the RESTOR International mission, this bright little boy now has a functioning hand.

Fifty of our Shine & Dine donors contributed a total of \$5,000 and the painting was donated to Kelowna General Hospital in honour of the volunteer work that our local doctors and nurses do.

Andrew Hughes, Heath Service Administrator for KGH; Jean Bird, Board Member Of RESTOR International and Mission Director of the last two missions to Bahir Dar, and Dr. Stan Valnicek, the Medical Consultant and Lead Plastic Surgeon of RESTOR International were honoured to present the painting to KGH.



As we transition our work in Ethiopia, our plan is to make one final trip to Bahir Dar to visit our patients and clinical partners in 2018. We are also exploring the feasibility of mounting a full mission to Nepal in 2018 where the need appears to be great in a variety of disciplines. Our involvement could be long term from a sustainability standpoint and there appears to be a good infrastructure to support a visiting health care team including supportive Rotarians on the ground.

There are many opportunities in Nepal that would require a variety of disciplines such as the ability to work in remote health care camps. At these camps, local residents can be screened for chronic conditions such as diabetes, hypertension, or TB and treated accordingly. Patients with more complicated surgical and medical needs, such as reconstructive plastic surgeries, would be transported to larger centers. There would also be a focus on education programs in the area of maternal and infant morbidity and mortality during childbirth, as well as adolescent life education programs such as reproductive health, mental health, and depression.

RESTOR International's Rotarian board members from Vancouver Island, Tim Cowan and Deb Nolan, along with our Surgical Care Coordinator Kim East are currently assessing the practicalities of a long term commitment in Nepal. A site visit is planned for mid-2017 with a full mission visit possible in 2018.
